TED LONG RECEIVES VWO AWARD

This year, Elizabethtown Borough Council is pleased to award the Vincent O'Connor Public Service Award to Dr. Theodore Long. Dr. Long was appointed the 13th president of Elizabethtown College in September 1996, and he has been a resident of Elizabethtown Borough since that time.

During the past 15 years, Dr. Long has exemplified the spirit of the

late Vince O'Connor by selflessly giving of his time to the public good of the residents of Elizabethtown. He has participated in a variety of community and civic endeavors building town/gown relationships with elected officials, business people, and residents.

Of course, any municipality with a college will have Town/Gown matters to handle, and Dr. Long's leadership has helped Borough Council and the College develop solutions that are beneficial to everyone. For example, Dr. Long assisted with crafting a successful student parking plan in neighborhoods adjacent to the college that made borough residents and students happy. In addition, his service on the board of the former Elizabethtown Economic Development Corporation helped integrate the college into the community beyond just being an institution in town.

Along with his leadership in Elizabethtown, Dr. Long has been active throughout the Central Pennsylvania region. He serves on the boards of the Lancaster Chamber of Commerce, the Economic Development Company of Lancaster County, the Fulton Opera House, The Foundation to Enhance Communities (Pennsylvania Capitol Region), and the United Way of Lancaster County. He is a frequent speaker at churches and civic organizations, writes periodic op-ed pieces on higher education, and is often engaged to lead strategic planning and board development processes for community organizations.

Prior to coming to Elizabethtown, Dr. Long served as Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Merrimack

College in North Andover, Massachusetts, and earlier he taught sociology at George Washington University, Hollins University and Washington and Jefferson College. A 1965 graduate of Capital University, where he majored in sociology and philosophy, Dr. Long earned a masters degree in sociology from Duke University (1968) and the Ph.D. in sociology from the University of Virginia (1979). In addition, he attended the Institute for Educational Management at Harvard University (1992) and the Harvard Seminar for New Presidents (1997). Dr. Long and his wife, Betty, are lifelong Lutherans and are members of Zion Lutheran Church in East Petersburg, where his brother is the senior pastor. The couple has two grown children, a son, Edward, and a daughter, Rachel Brenner.

OFFICER OF THE YEAR

Parking will be restricted on these streets from 6:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on the scheduled day. Residents may sweep sidewalks into the gutters prior to the street sweeper coming through. Please do not put leaves and/or sticks in the gutter as the sweeper will not pick them up.

CROSSWALK REGULATIONS

With summer approaching and more people out walking, we wanted to take some time to remind both motorists and pedestrians of their responsibilities in crosswalk areas. Most of us recognize a marked crosswalk on the road, but did you know that there are understood "crosswalks" at intersections whether they are marked on the road surface or not?

As a general rule, drivers must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk, or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection. It is important to note that you may notice crosswalks painted white - yellow is no longer the standard. Whenever a vehicle is stopped to allow a pedestrian to cross in these instances, the driver of the vehicle approaching from behind is prohibited from overtaking and passing the stopped vehicle. Pedestrians are not permitted to suddenly leave the curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which would be close enough to constitute a hazard.

To maintain safe conditions, both motorists and pedestrians are urged to exercise caution in and around all Borough crosswalks.

STREET PAVING SCHEDULE

The following streets will be paved during the summer/fall months of 2011:

Holly Street—Borough line to Hillside Avenue
Hess Avenue—end to West High Street
North Wilson Avenue—end to West High Street
South Wilson Avenue—end to West High Street
Beech Lane—Bainbridge Street to end
Kenbridge Lane—Beech Lane to Masonic Drive
Yorkshire Court—Kenbridge Lane to end

Each year the Borough's public works crew spends the summer before paving begins replacing water lines, sewer lines, hydrants, installing storm sewers and monitoring curb and sidewalk installation. Property owners are notified of the amounts of curb and sidewalk that need to be replaced before the 2011 paving begins. Property owners should also maintain their street trees to ensure a minimum clearance of 7 ½ feet above sidewalks and 14 feet above road surfaces.

CURBSIDE TRASH & RECYCLING

Residents may put out one 32-gallon bag weighing less than 40 pounds per week on their designated collection day, one large item that does not fit into a 32-gallon bag, and commingled recycling (all colors of glass, #1 - #7 plastics, aluminum and steel cans, newspapers, paper, phonebooks and magazines), and flattened cardboard. Tags may be purchased at the Borough office for additional bags at a cost of \$2 each. To best affix them to the bag, be sure to fold them over at some point so they stick to themselves as well as the bag.

Each year the Borough purchases 46,000 biodegradable Kraft leaf bags through a joint purchasing arrangement with the Lancaster County Solid Waste Management Authority for approximately \$0.28 each. While supplies last, Kraft leaf bags are provided free of charge to residents for yard waste and leaf collections. Residents are urged to take only the number of bags they expect to need for their individual property; there is a 25-bag limit each time you pick up bags.

GRASSCYCLE

As the weather warms and summer approaches, residents are again urged to consider grasscycling. To slow water loss and reduce the need to fertilize, be sure to cut your grass on a regular schedule using a sharp blade when the weather is dry. In addition to being easier on your back (no more moving heavy bags of grass around), your lawn and the planet will thank you!

Curbside collection the second Saturday of every month. Tie with string in bundles less than 4 feet in length or place in can or other container. Please keep bundles or containers less than 40 pounds in weight. Branches in bundles up to 20" in diameter will be accepted.

Curbside Collection of leaves placed in biodegradable kraft leaf bags (available free to residents) occurs on the same day as regular trash collection during the following weeks:

October 19, 20 & 21 November 2, 3 & 4 November 16, 17 & 18 November 30, December 1 & 2

Please put ONLY leaves in the bags, NO sticks, acorns, pinecones or other yard waste. Tops of Kraft leaf bags should be rolled closed; please do NOT use tape to seal the bags.

YARD WASTE COLLECTIONS

Curbside collection is scheduled for the following Saturdays:

April 2 May 7

In addition to leaves, sticks, acorns, pinecones and other yard waste placed in Kraft bags will be accepted at this time. Again, tops of Kraft leaf bags should be rolled closed; please do NOT use tape to seal the bags.

On January 18, 2011 the Elizabethtown Area Water Authority hosted a ribbon cutting and open house event attended by more than 50 officials and EAWA customers. Members of the public had the opportunity to tour the new filtration plant and offices while enjoying hors d'oeuvres and desserts provided by the Elizabethtown College Catering Team. The new state-of-the-art microfiltration technology by PALL Corporation was the highlight of the tour. Dale Treese, Chairman of the EAWA Board stated, "Water from this treatment facility, combined with that obtained from several wells, will enable the Authority to produce enough water for

our community for at least the next 20 years. This new system has the potential to filter 1.62 million gallons of water per day compared with the 800,000 gallons that could be filtered by our old system." The Authority would like to thank the attendees for making the open house a successful event.
