ELIZABETHTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT EXPANDS "DRUG TAKE BACK" PROGRAM

The Drug Take Back Program was started in 2012 in collaboration with Elizabethtown Area Communities That Care and since then has collected over 250 pounds of discarded prescription drugs. The police department has expanded its program to accept most unused prescription drugs that can be dropped off at the station, Monday–Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Prescription drug abuse is the fastest growing public health threat facing the nation today, with most of those controlled substances found in our own medicine cabinets. Keeping medications out of the wrong hands and properly disposing of them is a critical step in battling the growing problem of pharmaceutical drug abuse.

2017 RECYCLING SCHEDULE

Curbside Trash & Recycling

Residents may put out one 32-gallon container weighing less than 30 lbs. per week on their designated collection day, one large item that does not fit into a 32-gallon container, and commingled recycling. Cardboard is also accepted at the curb and will be picked up on your regular trash day (Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday) so long as it is flattened and easy for the loaders to handle. If flattened cardboard will not fit in your recycling container, it may be bundled and placed at the curb beside your recycling container. Shredded paper is no longer accepted as a recycled material and must be accepted as a recycled material and must be disposed of with regular trash. Also please be aware that recyclable items placed in plastic bags will not be collected.

Recycling bins are no longer available at the Borough Office, but you can stop by weekdays between 7:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. to pick up free 8" recycling symbol stickers. You can continue to use your green bin, or use any plastic container with a recycling sticker attached, even a full sized trash can with a lid if you choose.

Additional tags for trash collection may be purchased for \$2 each at the Borough Office and local stores. When using an extra container, affix the tag to the top item inside the container.

2017 Holiday Trash Delays

If a holiday should fall on your regular collection day (Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday), pickup will be moved to Friday of that week. Collection for the day falling on the holiday is the only day that will be affected—no other change in collection that week will occur. This year holiday trash delays will occur on the following dates:

 Tuesday July 4th will be collected on Friday, July 7th

 Thursday November 23rd (Thanksgiving) will be collected on Friday, November 24th

Yard Waste Collection

Yard waste (soft and woody) is collected every other week on the same day as regular trash and recycling pick-up. Soft and woody yard waste can be combined and placed in a container/can of your choice. As with recycling stickers, free yard waste stickers are available at the Borough Office between 7:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Branches not placed in a can or other non-disposable container should be tied with string in bundles up to 20" in diameter and less than 4' in length and set at the curb. Please keep in mind that containers should weight not more than 30 lbs. Kraft leaf bags are designated for collection of leaves only (see schedule), not for soft or woody yard waste.

The Borough no longer offers a special Christmas tree collection. Instead, once all bags, tinsel and decorations are removed, residents may put Christmas trees at the curb at their convenience for pick up on any of the regular yard waste collection dates.

Leaf Collections – {Leaves Only}
Curbside collection of leaves placed in biodegradable Kraft leaf bags (available free to residents) occurs on the same day as regular trash collection on the following dates:

October 31

•November 1, 2, 14, 15, 16, 28, 29, 30 •December 12, 13, 14

Roll the top of the Kraft bag closed, but please refrain from using tape to seal the bags.

Kraft Leaf Bag Distribution

Each year the Borough purchases 46,000 biodegradable Kraft leaf bags through a joint pur-chasing arrangement with the Lancaster County Solid Waste Management Authority for approximately \$0.28 each. While supplies last, Kraft leaf bags are provided free of charge to Borough residents for leaf collections. Residents are urged to take only the number of bags they expect to need for their individual property; there is a 25 bag limit each time you pick up bags. is a 25-bag limit each time you pick up bags. Please refrain from using Kraft bags for soft and woody yard waste collections. Kraft leaf bags are available at the Scout House in Community Park on Verdant Alley on the following dates:

MUNICIPAL SEPARATE STORM SEWER SYSTEM

PENN DOT RESURFACING PROJECTS

Penn DOT remains on schedule to resurface Market Street and Maytown Avenue this summer. To prepare for these paving projects sanitary sewer and storm sewer repairs and installation of sidewalks and ADA-compliant ramps will be completed this spring. 2017 PAVING SCHEDULE

The following streets are on the 2017 pavina schedule:

- Conoy Ave* (Spring Garden St—Radio Rd)
- •Lime St (Hillside—Conoy Ave)
- Radio Rd* (Hillside Ave—Northfield Dr)
 S Mount Joy St (High St—College Ave)

Each year the Borough's Public Works crew spends the summer before paving begins repairing sewer lines and stormwater facilities and monitoring curb and sidewalk installation. During this time EAWA also repairs water lines and hydrants. Property owners are notified of the amount of curb and sidewalk that needs to be replaced before 2017 paving begins. Residents are reminded to maintain street trees to ensure a minimum clearance of 7½' above sidewalks and 14' above road surfaces.

SPRING STREET SWEEPING

Sweeping Borough streets this spring will be done on the following schedule (weather permitting):

- •May 1 ODD side of the street, NORTH of High Street
- May 2 EVEN side of the street, NORTH of High Street
- May 3 ODD side of the street, SOUTH of and including High Street
- May 4 EVEN side of the street, SOUTH of and including High Street

Parking will be restricted on these streets from 6:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on the scheduled day. Residents may sweep sidewalk dirt into the gutters prior to the street sweeper coming through, but please do not put leaves and/or sticks in the gutter as the sweeper will not pick them up. Also, please note that while street sweeping will follow the schedule above, it is possible that additional passes will be made in certain areas.

CODE ENFORCEMENT REMINDERS

Tend to your grass and weeds before they grow higher than 6" tall. Refrain from parking unregistered or uninspected cars, or those not in working order, on public streets or in driveways.

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SPRING/SUMMER SEWER PROJECTS SCHEDULED

Road closures on N Lime St and Groff Ave can be expected this spring and summer as the Borough's dig crew repairs and replaces sewer lines to prepare for future street paving projects. Sanitary sewer projects to help reduce ground water entering the sewer collection system, replace broken pipe, and correct flow problems on N Lime St, Fieldstone Ln, and N Market St will be undertaken by outside contractors. The majority of work on N Market St will be done at night with anticipated single lane traffic flow but no closures. Help us keep our workers safe by being patient and remaining alert when traveling in or near these construction zones.

AMPHITHEATER REPLACEMENT SCHEDULE

Thanks in large part to a generous estate donation from the Edna M. Barnes Fund, the amphitheater in Community Park will be replaced this summer with a new, open-air metal structure moved out of the floodplain and angled more toward the Memorial Wall. Work will begin after Memorial Day and be completed by the end of summer.
